THOUSANDS TO MARCH FOR ERA

On Sunday, July 9, 1978, delegations from over 145 organizations (list attached) will march on the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C., to demonstrate their support for the Equal Rights Amendment and the ERA extension. The National ERA March is receiving enthusiastic support from all over the country with organizations responding to the call to attend by organizing buses, trains, caravans and charter planes to bring ERA supporters to this historic event.

"The March will be a massive demonstration of the widespread grassroots support for the ERA at the site where the final decision on the extension proposal will be made -- the U.S. Capitol," said NOW President Eleanor Smeal.

"We envision a spectacular event that will stir the emotions of those who value human dignity and justice for all. We propose a reenactment of the suffrage marches which will link us with our history and provide a unique format for the modern-day struggle for Constitutional rights for women."

The processional style March, patterned after early Suffrage marches, will feature delegations dressed in white marching in unison behind a delegation banner (replicas of the early suffrage banners).

Marchers, bands, trolleys carrying suffragists, modern dance troops and horses will assemble on the western end of the Mall (14th and Madison) at 11:00 am and the march will stretch east on Constitution Avenue.

Along the route, merchers dressed in original suffrage dresses will display the Equal Rights Amendment on the steps of the National Archives, where the U.S. Constitution is housed. A color-guard will toll the Liberty Bell to proclaim the freedom of all people and symbolize the glaring omission of women in the Constitution. The National Archives is also the point at which the 1913 Suffragist March led by the late Alice Paul, author of the Equal Rights Amendment, was halted due to disruptions.

The marchers will converge on the Capitol, where an ERA program will begin. Among those participating in the program will be Congressman Don Edwards, Congresswoman Elizabeth Holtzman, Congresswoman Margaret Heckler, Congresswoman Barbara Mikulski, President of the National Organization for Women Eleanor Smeal, President of the National Conference of Puerto Rican Women Carman Votaw, and Special Assistant to the President Midge Costanza.
