Dear Andy,

Sorry I couldn't answer earlier but I've not much time for letter writing.

We (Herbert, Walter and I) wake up at 5:30 to do the chores then breakfast at 6. We're out on the field by 7. Dinner is at twelve but we usually come in later than that. After $1\frac{1}{2}$ hour rest we go out on the field at 1:30 and come in 6:30 or 7 PM. We do evening chores, eat supper then retire.

I've been irrigating a forty-acre alfalfa field

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ever since Tuesday - a total
of ten days. I never want to
see water again! One bad thing
about irrigating you have to go out at
night to fix the water and I've
been coming in 9:30 every night

The boss is a pretty good
fellow. His wife does the cooking
for us and the food is
pretty good. We've had three
pies in two weeks - lemon, raisin and cherry
plus good puddings. We get enough to eat.

Single is a (cow) town. It
has a drug store, a market, beauty shop,
two barber shops, a hardware and
clothing store, post office, grocery store,
cafe, saloon and some other
buildings I failed to notice

We transferred only twice on the trip - first at Beaver when about 40 miles from Singu. We couldn't sleep on the bus. The scenery was awful.

A fellow from Poston came here after we did and he intends to stay here. He's a nice fellow - married and a father of a 10 month baby. His wife and baby are in Poston yet but he hopes to have them join him here in a few weeks.

What do you think of this segregation business? Anyone we know that will be affected? I hope Heart Mtn is the center chosen for these segregated people. Well.
