That these stock-thieves and other persons who have so frequently violated the laws in the said county of Johnson have by threats and other means driven many respectable citizens

and property holders from the said county of Johnson, and have notified others to leave.

their disregard for law so great, that they have selected over twenty of the most honorable, reliable, trustworthy and law-abiding citizens of the county as targets for their unlawful intentions, and have placed the names of these citizens upon what is called a "death list," and have threatened openly and frequently to assassinate them.

That the situation in the said county of Johnson has become so threatening and so dangerous that it is wholly unsafe for any citizen of said county, who is not in sympathy with these stock-thieves, to travel unattended through the county.

H.
